ACTIVITY 1: Review and Confirm the Draft Vision & Guiding Principles

- Keeping the small-town feel
- Including "Pet Friendly Downtown", in the vision statement;
- Downtown should be welcoming to people from all walks of life and backgrounds, for this, emphasis on inclusive and equitable strategies to revitalize downtown should be explored (since Peninsula has a reputation of being fancy and high profile);
- Character & identity need to understand what we want, a local or regional destination;
- Plaza design shall consider flexible programs and spaces, so it's not specific to a purpose;
- Businesses strategies for business growth with consideration of locally own businesses;
- El Camino Real making it a mixed use corridor;
- Mobility –
- Strategies to minimize auto-trips are a must, we don't want to drive to the downtown on daily basis;
- Providing affordable EV charging.

ACTIVITY 2 - Discuss The Public Realm Concepts

- Character and identity
 - Need a consistent and harmonious style and feel
 - Something is needed that celebrates identity of everyone. Programs and spaces accommodating activities as Yoga, tai-chi, community yoga – so people from everywhere can join;

- Fountain/Water feature of some kind is needed in the downtown to create some strong image;
- Something unexpected/element of surprise;
- Gateway elements at alley and parking entrances are encouraged.

Downtown Vibrancy

- Diversity of businesses:
 - We have a good mix of restaurants how can we make them further diverse?;
 - Restaurants act as a magnet for people;
 - Many businesses are struggling to exist.

Mobility & Connectivity


- Public transportation "does not exist";
- There are no buses in neighborhoods anymore;
- Shuttle pilot which the city implemented some years ago was a helpful to access downtown, between 4:00 – 8:00 PM, without driving cars, approaches like this are recommended;
- If you are narrowing 600 block, please note that there is already a spillover in residential areas.

Equity and Resilience

- Local small shops are gone as landlords charge bay area rents;
- We have a regulations that have kept out big businesses, but due to that we may be missing on some good ones;
- Cooling zones in summer;
- Apart from climate resilience, earthquake resilient strategies should be included.

- Affordable EV charging do we need the word affordable?;
- o If the City installs, do they have control over the costs?

ACTIVITY 2 - Discuss The Public Realm Concepts

- Character and identity
 - Preference of concept:
 - Everyone prefers Concept 1 because it's bolder and stronger because its consistent;
 - Everyone really likes the water play;
 - Perhaps we can add art installation like San Jose;
 - How would the flow of seating work with tree lines;
 - The whole thing can be curb less and there is enough space for the seating;
 - The Union bank outlet- is that temporary or permanent?;
 - Outdoor reading in front of the Reading Bug should keep going.

Downtown Vibrancy

- Activation of uses: would that be broken down by ages?;
- Prior to 6:00 PM it's a very local space;
- Not a lot of nightlife;
- Question: what kind of downtown times do we want? That will dictate what kind of businesses we will attract?;

- 7:00 AM 4:00 PM errands time in the downtown:
- Weekends- very different feel/ attracting folks from out of town;
- Questioning the need for gateways because its already so popular;
- Do we actually need anything in mid-Laurel?:
- YAC member- consistent activities for youth is important:
 - This project doesn't cover the CalTrain Station plaza- but that's a great place for movies or other free activities;
 - EX: Hillsdale Shopping Center plaza;
- List of Preferred Uses:
 - Theatre:
 - Non-paid seating with wi-fi;
 - Skate park;
 - Non-traditional benches/ sturdy;
 - Bowling alley;
- Indoor or Outdoor Recreational space such as Urban Putt;
- Concept 2 is too zig-zaggy; perhaps do that at a smaller scale in a sperate space;
- The current reality of Harrington park there are a lot of homeless people currently because it's narrow and dark; not well-lit;
- If we get music at the park how will that impact the music at Faith and Spirits Piano Bar?;
- Burton Park already meets the lawn need with the stage and community;
- Performances; in the downtown it would be better if it's paved with seating rather than a lawn:
- Does Harrington Park want to be an event space?:
- Can we extend Harrington Park through the back into the alleyway towards Mama Coco?:
- Have we confirmed that Wheeler Plaza is not going to be a parking lot and will be a plaza?;
- Wheeler Plaza should be facing towards the alley;
- For some programming- we can have cheaper food vendors/kiosks;
 - Urban Block- company takes shipping containers and builds them into restaurants:
 - Keep things flexible to change as the needs change;
 - Like a Food Hall like San Pedro Square Market;
 - Have the goblin walk parade there;
 - We want people to hangout without having to pay for things.

Mobility & Connectivity

- Could we only keep the 700 block closed and not touch the other blocks?;
 - Staff heard that there is a lot of focus on the 700 block and other businesses on the adjacent blocks also want the benefits of being in the pedestrian zone;
- Circulation: is there a bigger plan to improve connectivity within the area?;
 - Response: we are looking into the circulation;
- How will the businesses be impacted during all the DTSP improvement construction?;
 - While closed for construction-let's get the alleyways to be the entrances;
- They would like to see the street sections next to the uses to see which one works better:
- Can we expand the 700 block into the 600 block without changing the current parking?;


Equity and Resilience

- Youth- the food is too expensive; need more casual and affordable restaurants and retail;



ACTIVITY 1: Review and Confirm the Draft Vision & Guiding Principles

- Emphasize equity and affordability within the community;
- Higher rents leading to increased product prices;
- Review and potentially modify form-based codes;
- Consider seasonal variations in planning;
- Integrate events for both children and adults;
- Site next to Harrington Park as a potential housing element site;

ACTIVITY 2 - Discuss The Public Realm Concepts

- Character and identity
 - Consider alleys as "gateways" with better wayfinding;
 - Assess why people may not be visiting downtown apart from specific restaurants;
 - Should San Carlos aspire to become a dining destination;


Downtown Vibrancy

- Create a distinct identity and character for the downtown area, strong opinion on not becoming another Burlingame;
- Prioritize activity-oriented spaces, such as an ice-skating rink, lasermax, a bowling alley, artbias;
- Develop a decentralized Youth Center along the 600-700-800 block or a "youth activity cluster";
- Centralize the location for the farmers' market booth to increase visibility and access to retail stores on the 600 block;


Mobility & Connectivity

- Analyze the implications of stiff parking fines, particularly in alleys, and its impact on employees;
- Look into making alleys pedestrian-friendly, drawing inspiration from Burlingame;
- Develop Cherry Street as a pedestrian walkway from CalTrain parking lots;
- Focus on improving the flow of parking and overall circulation, especially in relation to the Caltrain parking lot;
- Consider ease of pedestrian circulation from restaurants and beer gardens near the Caltrain station to San Carlos downtown by improved accessibility and safety for crossing El Camino Real:
- Show parking and circulation in alleys in the diagrams;

- Manage parking for the yoga studio on the 600 block to accommodate the needs of both patrons and delivery drivers who park there to access the restaurants on 700 block;
- Prioritize parking areas in alleys closer to El Camino Real to ease traffic on other blocks (18 wheelers blocking commuters in the morning in the downtown core).
